I. ROLL CALL – Chair Frank called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE – Commissioner Cole led all in the Pledge of Allegiance.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES – *A motion to approve minutes for **August 1, 2016** was made by Commissioner Alexander; Commissioner Randolph seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.*

IV. PUBLIC COMMENT - None.

V. SPECIAL REQUESTS/ REPORTS/ PRESENTATIONS

A. Youth Commissioner Interview Panel – Kathy Barsotti

Ms. Barsotti announced that applications were being received for Youth Commissioner positions in the City. While the current Youth Commissioner Logan Cole is eligible for another term, he must still go through the application/interview process that normally takes place for appointment. Staff will conduct interviews for qualified applicants in November and is seeking two Commissioners to sit on the interview panel. Commissioners Radford and Stearns volunteered for the assignment.

B. Update on Roseville City School District Joint Use Agreements – Tara Gee

Ms. Gee provided the Commission an update on the Joint Use Agreements (JUAs) between the City of Roseville and the Roseville City School District (RCSD). Currently, RCSD is undertaking a number of renovations including, but not limited to, new fencing which has prompted the need for clarification of our agreements. Staff sought feedback from the Commission on these recent changes to include in the ongoing discussions planned with the District.

Staff comments:

- Acknowledged that new fencing at some of our joint school/park sites has prompted more conversations
- The District and City has a long standing and successful partnership and that we are having good dialogue about this
- Potentially piloting an auto-lock system at Dietrich Park/Sergeant School

- Reiterated that our goal is to create more consistency between school sites and find balance between school needs and public recreation needs

Commission comments:

- Joint use between the schools and parks is one of the cornerstones of our city's planning efforts and important to continue
- Surprised; Hoped to have had a more inclusive public outreach process to the community
- Is fencing on school or park property? Please verify.
- Is the City maintaining any fields inside the fenced areas? If so, need to revisit City maintenance.
- They were united in asking us to find ways to keep public access to school grounds (not buildings) on evenings, weekends, holidays and vacation periods
- All understood the need to keep school campuses closed during school hours, but unclear why turf and recreation amenities are not available (Sargeant/Dietrich) during off hours
- RCONA has expressed the need for balance between safety during school hours and accessibility during non-school hours
- Was there a way to enclose the buildings and keep the grounds open?
- Are there other school districts taking this same action? (Answer- not in this area)
- Are the new schools in the WRSP (Fiddymont Farms/W70) fenced? – Yes, but different – Mr. Alexander suggested that all P & R Commissioners visit the sites with fencing.
- Expressed concerns about:
 - how we plan moving forward,
 - being careful that we keep aesthetics in mind (concerned about feeling too closed in versus an open/warm feeling)
 - finding balance between school and park needs
 - how to ensure public access on weekends, holidays and vacation periods
 - future

Public Comment: Chris Kraft, 20+ year resident of the Sargeant neighborhood, addressed the Commission. He provided handouts to the Commission. Commented that the fencing of the school/park at Sargeant/Dietrich affects healthy lifestyle choices. He expressed concerns about the current spirit of the Joint Use Agreements, the lack of public discussion on the decision to fence the school fields for public use and lack of accessibility. The school sites are public land for healthy lifestyle choices after school is dismissed. Previously Sargeant had 5 access points; now only 1 gate is open. Had RCSD had a more open process before, Mr. Kraft felt a better option could have been identified. He asked the Commission/City to conduct an open dialogue with RCSD to find a better resolution; suggested more positive signage at the joint use sites and also asked for more than one gate to be opened at Dietrich.

Chair Frank solicited the large audience (high school students) for additional comments; no additional comments were received.

C. Business Plan – Mike Shellito Indoor Pool – Alexa Pritchard

Ms. Pritchard reviewed the Business Plan for the Mike Shellito Indoor Pool (MSIP). She reviewed the need for the plan, the history of the first edition and the goals for future development. Key Performance Measures were established to track the challenges and successes of the plan implementation. Ms. Pritchard provided significant details on statistics staff use to measure business plan successes and challenges. Staff will continue to use the plan as a guiding document and update it yearly. Ms. Pritchard profiled a member of MSIP and the success our members have from living a healthy lifestyle.

Commissioners had questions regarding staff retention, increase of fees, fall programs at MSIP (floating pumpkin patch), frequency of the business plan, non-resident fees, plans for a pool in WRSP, and business plans for the other pools the City manages.

VI. REPORTS / COMMENTS/ COMMISSION/STAFF

Updates and Reports from Department Staff:

- Ms. Gee provided an update regarding the Sports Complex and our work on the permit for the Complex and the plans for CEQA.
- Ms. Barsotti updated the Commission on temporary staff salaries and our efforts to retain staff.

- Ms. Barsotti highlighted the Department's upcoming events: Pumpkin Patch, Oktoberfest, Family Fun Night, and Remembering Our Fallen.

Commission Comments

- Questions regarding Holiday Events – they begin last week in November.
- Family Fun Night – always a great event!
- Chair Frank provided an opportunity for youth in the audience to give a shout out for their high schools: Woodcreek, Roseville and Granite Bay!

VII. Adjournment

Motion to adjourn was introduced by Commissioner Stearns; Commissioner Radford seconded and the motion passed unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 8:25 PM. The next meeting is scheduled on November 7, 2016.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION

Approve the proposed park naming policy revisions, approve the following name for the noted new park; and forward your recommendation on to the City Council for formal approval.

- 1) W-50A Neighborhood Park Site: a 6.5 acre school/park site off of Westbrook Boulevard in West Roseville – **Sierra Crossing Park**;

BACKGROUND

Advertisement for names for the W-50A school/park site occurred in August 2016. The advertisement period extended for the full month of August. The Park Naming Subcommittee met on October 11, 2016 to review the name submissions along with names on the “active” from last year. “Active” are those names received the year prior and not selected.

The policy allows for a short list of names to be forwarded for recommendation to the City Council. This year, the Subcommittee elected to forward only one name recommendation for the new park.

Consistent with policy, names not selected for recommendation will remain on the “active” list for one year. Names submitted during this latest advertisement are attached.

Also under consideration for approval are revisions to the park naming policy. Revisions include:

1. General clean up items
2. Add “Volunteer” as part of the criteria for naming a park after an individual (Paragraph B under criteria)
3. Outlining use of “Roseville” in the name for regional or city-wide parks and recreation facilities
4. Avoidance of duplication of names (surnames or family members) to ease confusion for the public
5. Add a percentage of parks of the overall inventory to be geographically named
6. Add number of years a nominee has lived in Roseville on the submission form

FISCAL IMPACT

Park identification signs for new parks will be included in the construction budgets of each park.

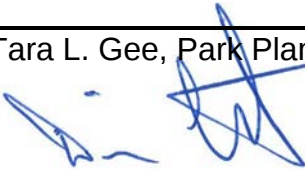
ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

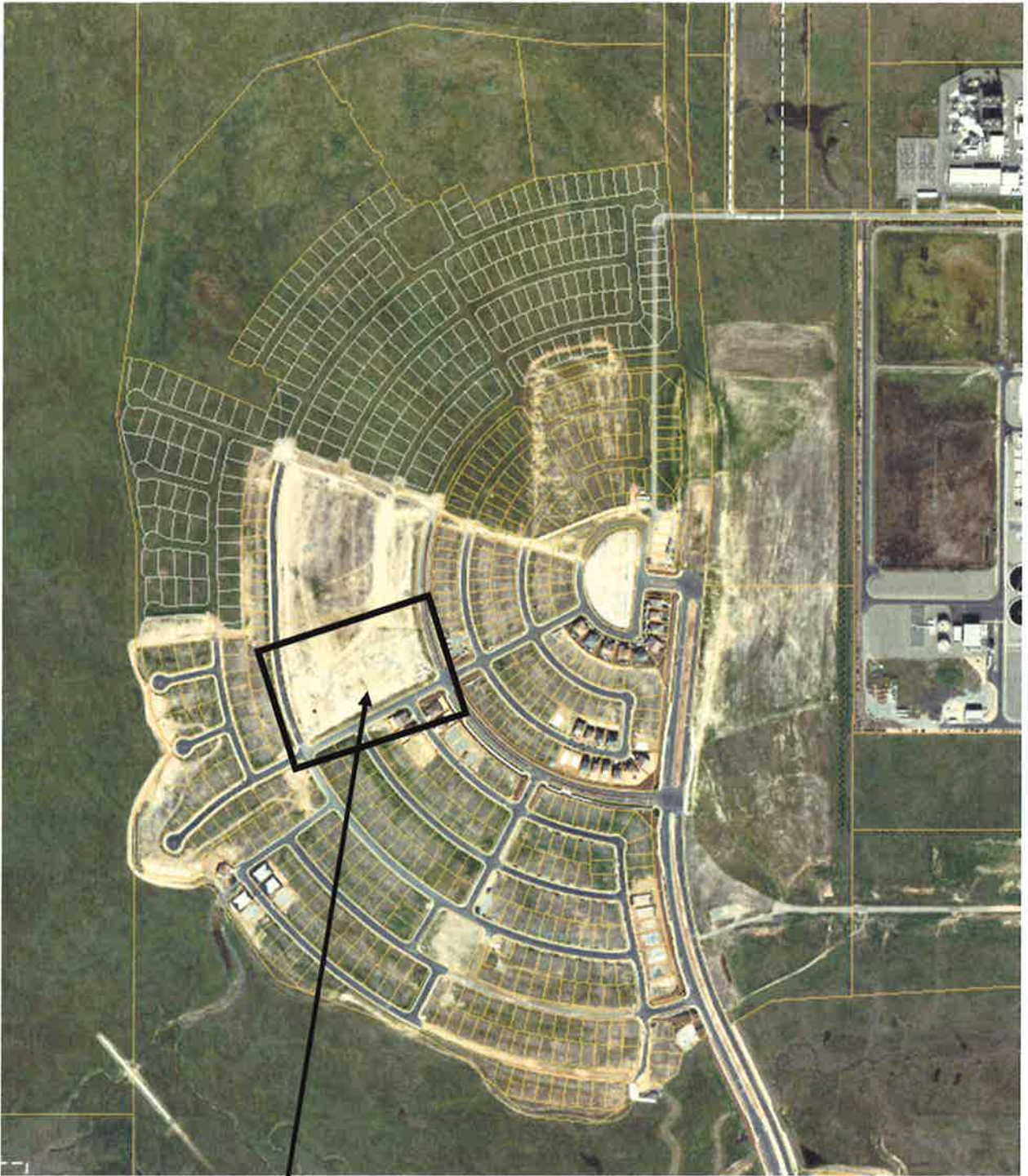

SHARON TELLES

The Fiddymment Farm Neighborhood Association (FFNA), and the WestPark Neighborhood Association (WPNA), members of the Roseville Coalition of Neighborhood Associations (RCONA), are honored to nominate Sharon Telles as a significant Roseville Community leader, and place her name for consideration in the *Name for a Park* program. Sharon was a significant factor in the activation of WFFNA in 2008, and it would be very fitting if one of our great parks could be named in her honor. Sharon has enthusiastically devoted her professional career and good will toward the betterment of her fellow man and the Roseville and Placer County community.

The Strum Shop in Roseville, California Stakes its Claim as California's Ukulele Motherlode

[Editor's note: Stu Herreid, co-founder of The Strum Shop, died September 9, 2016.]

A strip mall about 20 miles northeast of Sacramento, California, may seem like the unlikely epicenter of the Golden State's ukulele scene, but thanks to owners Stu Herreid and Dan Elliot, the Strum Shop in Roseville has become just that.

[Editor's note: The Strum Shop moved to a new location in Roseville in July 2016, see the visit link.]

The animated and amiable Herreid barely takes a moment to inhale as he recounts how he and Elliott built up their shop. Sitting inside the store's compact office—which is lined with more cigar-box, vintage, and banjo-ukuleles than anyone could call reasonable—he tells how they amassed a huge selection of ukuleles and started a burgeoning uke club, as well as a nonprofit wing that works to get kids playing

the instrument in schools. The Strum Shop has also become an essential performance stop for touring ukulele players like **Herb Ohta Jr, Kimo Hussey, Sarah Maisel, and Craig Chee**.

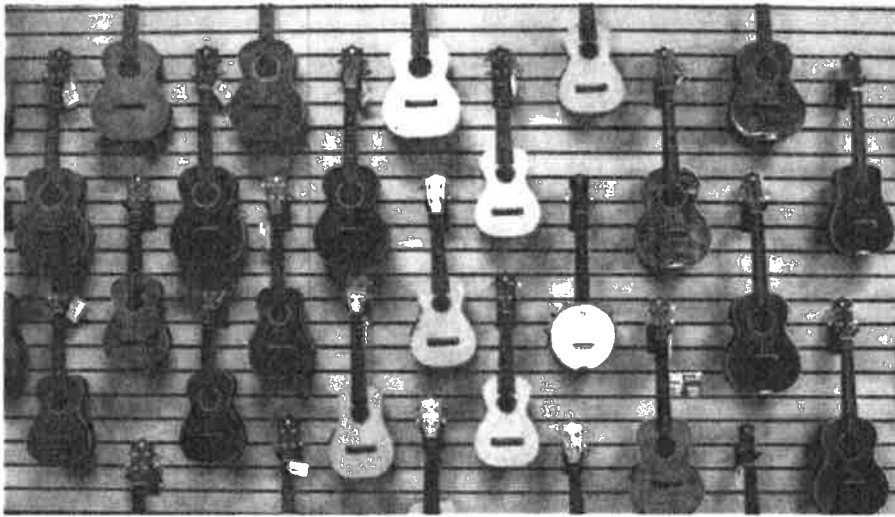
“The premise of the store is community involvement first,” says Herreid, who, when not plucking away on his favorite banjo-uke, can be found teaching, running a workshop or club meeting, or booking acts for the store’s stage. The man’s life revolves around strumming four strings and serving a dedicated and expansive population hungry for music-making merriment. That wholesale uke identification all started thanks to the popularity of a local ukulele club.

While working as a banjo and mandolin teacher at another store—where Elliott worked on the retail side—Herreid noticed that the shop was selling several ukuleles a day, but had no one teaching the increasingly popular instrument. He quickly assigned himself the role and dove into learning the uke, a decision that would soon change the course of his life. His own interest in the ukulele was growing, as was the number of students signing up for lessons, and Herreid soon realized it was time to seek out other ways to meet the demand. “We started a once-a-month ukulele club,” he says.

“It began with six people, then it went to 13, 20, 40, and 60—pretty soon I had 80 people meeting once a month.”

Despite the community’s growing interest and sales, however, the store’s owner wasn’t turning his attention to the ukulele’s allure, so Herreid and Elliott hatched a plan to open their own uke-focused venture. Within months, they had a business plan and were looking for a space to house a diverse assortment of ukuleles and uke-centric products, which could serve as a meeting space for the Uke University and River City Uke clubs, and provide rooms for lessons, as well as a small performance stage.

While there’s some space at the Strum Shop for other stringed instruments—including guitars, mandolins and banjos—the ukulele reigns supreme. From the front of the 1,900-square-foot store to the back, the walls are lined with ukuleles of all shapes and sizes, from fanciful sub-\$100 Kala Makala Ukadelics to dozens of midrange ukes to custom hand-built ukuleles from California luthiers, like Mike Pereira and Dave Iriguchi. Plus there’s several Tahitian ukuleles, the fun and loud cousin of the ukulele that’s heard on the theme song of the cult television show *Arrested Development*. Many of the items on display on the shop’s floor are on wheels so that they can be rolled out of the way for the store’s frequent club meetings and concerts.



Central to the store's business philosophy is what Herreid calls the ukulele's "aloha spirit," which promotes unity and sharing among the uke community. The inclusive vibe really comes to light at the club meetings, where players help each other as often as the leader does.

"We're going to do one thing at the club—play ukulele and unite our spirits," Herreid says. "If you're having trouble at the ukulele club, the people on both sides of you will be like, 'Here, let me show you how to do it.' I love the spirit of it."

The engagement and involvement that runs deep in the store's bones also extends into the local community, thanks to an initiative that grew out of one of the store's affiliated clubs, the River City Ukulele Orchestra. One of the group's activities is to raise money for the nonprofit Ukes for Schools, a program that works with teachers, parents, and students to get ukuleles into the schools and to help sustain music programs that have withered in the face of recession-era budget cuts.

Ukes for Schools is more than just an effort to nurture new musicians, it's become a way for some teachers—using the club as bait—to motivate their students to improve academically. "A teacher told the kids that if they wanted to be in the ukulele club the next year, each of them would have to raise their reading level by one full grade over the summer," says a visibly proud Herreid. Of the kids in the club, "out of 32, 31 of them raised their reading level one grade. She told them 'Playing ukulele is a privilege, you've got to work for this.'"

Demanding a commitment to the program is central to the success of Ukes for Schools. For each school, it either helps to raise money to purchase ukuleles, or it loans them out if the school has a supportive principal and a teacher with a passion for the instrument. "We don't give them ukuleles, we loan them ukuleles," says Herreid. "As long as they have an active program, we never want to see those ukuleles again. If the program stops, we want those ukuleles back so that we can loan them to somebody else."

Herreid is also quick to point out that their program got a big leg up thanks to the generosity of Kala Brand Music, the company's founder, Mike Upton, and its director of sales and marketing, Rick Carlson, who have donated hundreds of ukuleles to the program: "They gave us 50 ukes to get started. Then Rick called one day and said, 'Could you use a pallet of ukes?' I didn't know what a pallet was, but I said sure."

When the shipment arrived, it turned out to contain almost 250 ukes—some "maybe weren't pristine for retail purposes, but were still perfectly fine for institutional purposes, like schools. That really got the program off the ground," says Herreid.

Elliott, a 40-something, music-industry veteran, who keeps his eyes on the retail side of the shop, doesn't see the "third wave" of ukulele popularity slowing down, especially given the number of people who have gotten hooked on playing in recent years.

"People keep thinking that the ukulele thing is just a passing fad, but it keeps getting bigger every year," Elliot says, standing in front of a wall display containing every imaginable brand of ukulele strings. "It's a very collectible instrument, and very few of our ukulele club members have just one instrument—most have two, three, four, or more. You have to get one with a low-G, a high-G, a soprano, a banjo-uke.

"I'm scrambling to keep instruments on the wall."

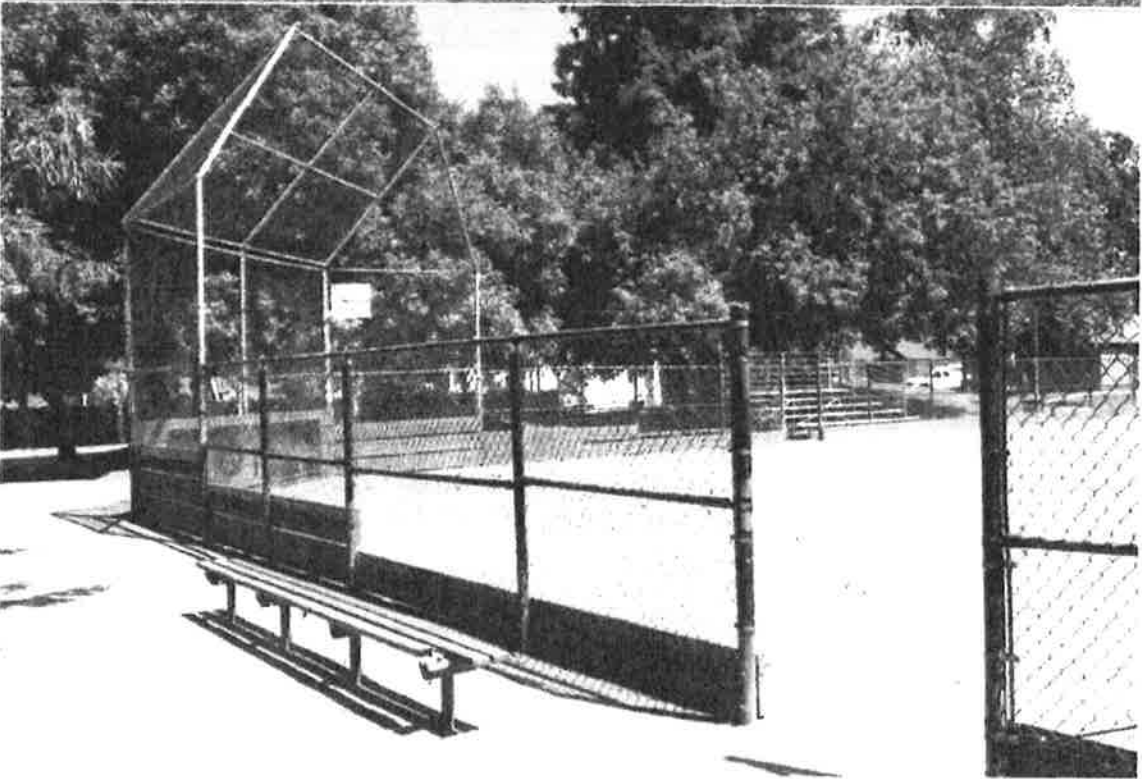

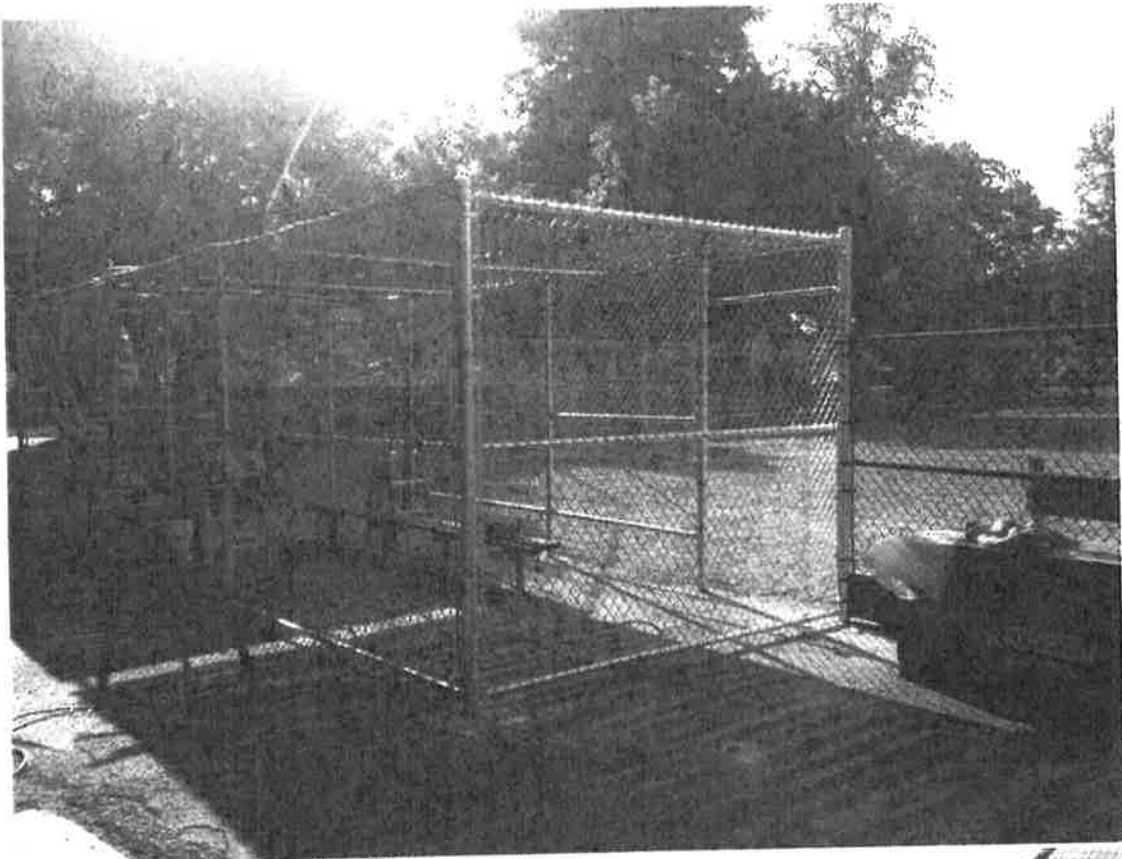

Notice the splintered wood at the corner of the bench and the low six foot fence protecting the players and spectators from the action on the playing field

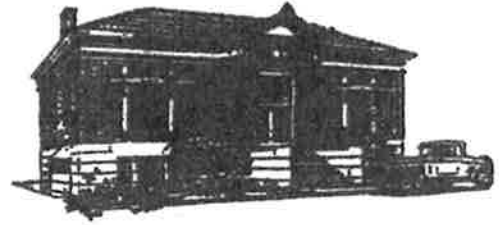

Steve Markas was a long time (24 yrs.) Parks' Superintendent in the City of Roseville and an active community leader. When he began his tenure in 1967, there were only a handful of parks in Roseville and one zoo. Upon his retirement in 1991, there were more than a couple dozen parks. He was very involved in the planning and design of those parks, and along with Ed Mahany, Steve was instrumental in the design and realization of Maidu Park. Steve established and trained the "Tree Crew" early in his tenure, and began the first vestiges of the urban forestry program. Roseville parks and their facilities under Steve's watch became known for their quantity, quality and beautiful maintenance. He was critical in helping Roseville obtain status as a Tree City USA. Steve's life-long love of nature and beautiful landscaping carried over into his community activities. He was a frequent guest lecturer and demonstrator for Sierra College and Sacramento State horticulture and landscape courses, the Roseville Garden Club and others. After his retirement, he continued to donate his time and expertise to area gardeners, former colleagues, service clubs, neighbors and anyone who had questions about a tree's health or pruning or landscape design. He was a well-known member of the Roseville community and actively involved in Roseville service clubs (Elk's, Lion's and Mason's). Naming a park in his honor would be a way to memorialize a man who gave so much of himself to the City of Roseville and its beautiful park system.

Steve Markas left mark on city's park system

Steve Markas, a longtime Roseville parks superintendent whose tenure coincided with some of the biggest additions to the city's parks department, has died. He was 84. Markas died Dec. 13 of old age, his family said. Markas was a lifelong nature-lover who found the perfect fit working in parks, said his daughter, Stephanie Cervantes. He came to Roseville as the department's chief maintenance official in 1967, when just a handful of parks served the young city. Over the next 24 years, the city added numerous parks facilities, and Markas was heavily involved in their planning and design. "One thing Roseville's known for is not only the number of parks but also how well they were maintained. That was Steve's job," said former City Manager Al Johnson. His impact was felt in several parks department accomplishments, including helping Roseville obtain status as Tree City USA. "He was real instrumental in starting the whole tree crew and in kind of the first vestiges of the urban forestry program," said Mike Shellito, the city's current Parks and Recreation chief who worked with Markas. Steve Markas was born in Kinney, Minnesota, on December 29, 1923 to Croatian immigrants, Annie Carich and John Markas. He

served in the Navy during World War II, working as a mechanic at the Alameda Naval Base. After graduating from UC Berkeley, he joined the San Mateo parks department. He moved to Roseville after taking the superintendent's job there, and raised his only child with his first wife, Millie, who died in 1981. After retirement in 1991, Steve Markas remained in Roseville and continued to be active, donating his time and expertise to area gardeners. "You would find him usually outside up in a tree up until a few years ago pruning things," his daughter said. Markas was a well-known member of the Roseville community. He was a proud Elk, Lion and Mason, Cervantes said. "He loved being outside and he loved people," she said. A celebration of life was scheduled for 2 p.m. Sunday at the Elk's Lodge on Brady Lane. Interment will be private.

Members of the Park Naming Committee, I am requesting that you consider "Nela Luken" as the name of a future park in the West Roseville area.

I was one of the fortunate people who was able to work with Nela over the 18 years that she committed her life to the City of Roseville. Nela and I both started our professional and family lives here within the City. In 1995, Nela started working in the Planning Department as an Associate Planner. Her professionalism, negotiation skills and more importantly, her intuitive ability to read people and problem solve propelled her to the positions of Senior Planner and then Principal Planner. She was about to assume the role of the City's first Planning Manager, but on July 19, 2013, she was involved in a tragic car accident that took both her life and that of her daughter, 9 year old Sydney.

During her time here with the City, she was instrumental in guiding future development and making the City what it is today. She worked on 8 specific plans, and staffed the Design Committee, Growth Management Visioning Committee and the Grants Commission. Her responsibilities over the years included design review and the processing of numerous current and long range entitlements. She worked on many Specific Plan projects, including the North Central, North, Northeast, Northwest, West Roseville, Amoruso, Sierra Vista, and Creekview Specific Plans. More specifically, she was the lead City representative and instrumental in the completion of the North Plan, West Plan, Sierra Vista and Creekview Specific Plans. These Specific Plans have brought in 12,921 additional acres to the City, as well as providing housing opportunities for an additional 58,342 new residents. Attached to this submittal is a map that is intended to provide you with a picture of the impact that her efforts, in partnership with the efforts of other; City staff, Commissions, City Council and the development community have created.

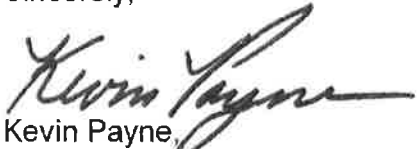
Nela not only invested her professional time into the community, but she was also committed to the City on a personal level. When she and her husband decided to start a family they bought a home in Northwest Roseville by the Woodcreek Oaks Golf Course and the Aquatics center. She made this investment, because she wanted to live and work within the community that she helped to build. She spent numerous hours volunteering at the Aquatics center as both her daughter and son were, and are Seawolves. As a mother of two Seawolves, Nela strengthened her bond with the community. She integrated and formed close relationships with other Roseville families as part of this activity as well as others (e.g. den mother for cub scouts). Nela's unfortunate accident occurred while driving back from Redding after spending the weekend with other Roseville families at one of the numerous off-site Seawolves swim meets.

I count myself fortunate to have been Nela's colleague, but more importantly her friend. Although I am submitting this nomination with a heavy heart, I know that it is the right thing to do. Nela's efforts have provided a road map for the development of approximately 20,000 new homes within the west Roseville area. This road map insures that future residents will enjoy easy access to schools, commercial centers and public facilities. They

will enjoy the high quality of life that our existing residents have, because fire and police services have been planned and financed. Recreational park amenities that are not found in other communities will be available to them, because Nela worked with; Community Members, Parks and Recreation staff, the Parks Commission, the City Council and multiple developers to ensure that the Roseville that she cared so much about would be available to others in the future.

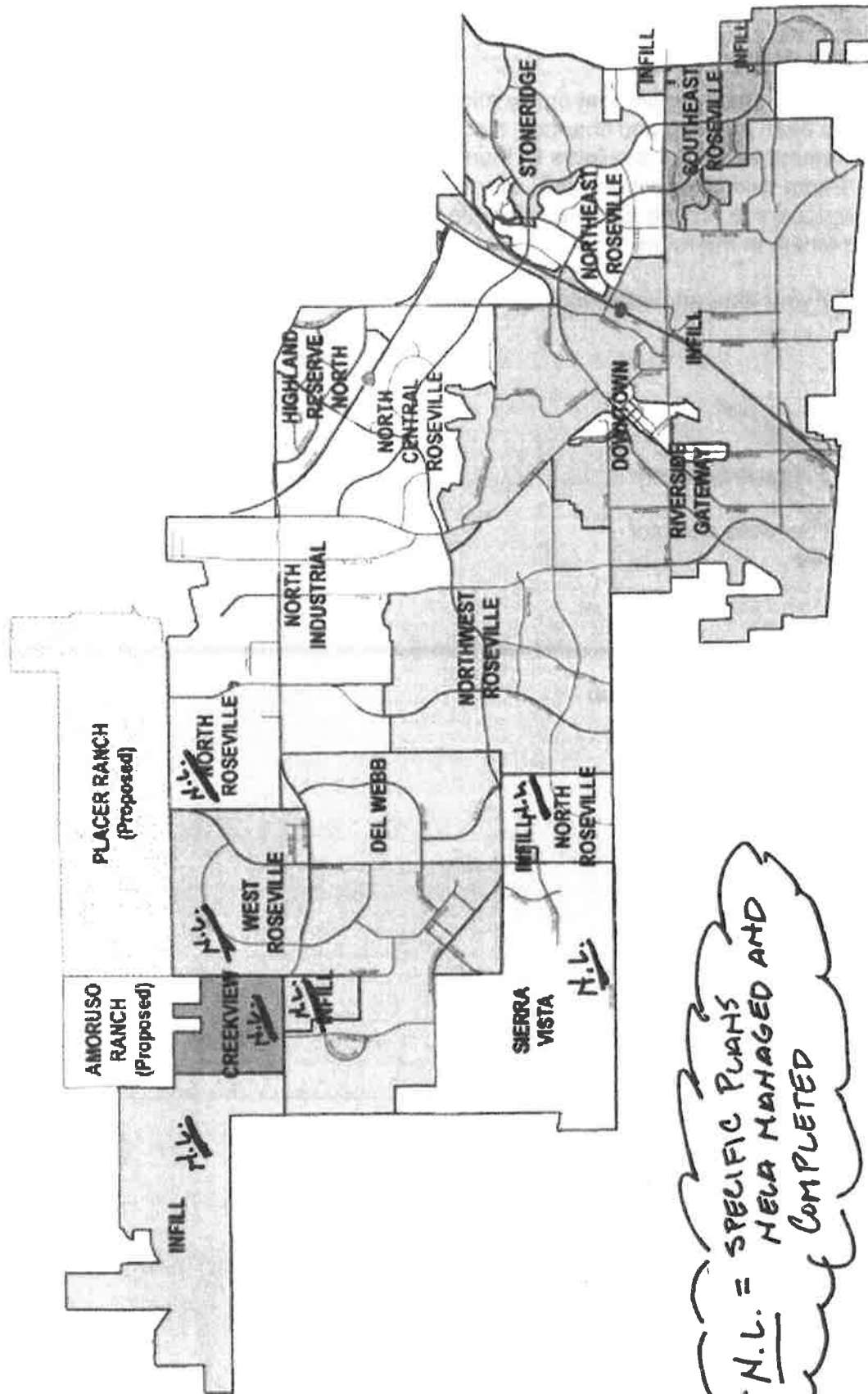

To those tasked with naming three new parks in Roseville:

I heard on last night's news that Roseville is asking for citizens to recommend potential names of three new parks which are coming on line. I was intrigued by this story and it brought me back to my youth and the hours (every day of the summer) that I spent at Garibaldi Park near my home and I watched many softball games, played flag football for my junior high team, and went down the long slide when I was little at Royer Park. I was fortunate enough to live in Roseville in the 50's and 60's receiving a first rate education at the Vernon St. School, Cirby School, Atlantic St. School, and Roseville High. What a great place to grow up.

My parents continued to live there until 2001 and even today at the age of 102 my mother fondly thinks back at her days living in Roseville. And I haven't even brought into the conversation that my wife is from Roseville and her parents and sisters are still part of the community. I still think of Roseville as home and so I thought I would throw in a couple of names for consideration as you make the decision to name the new parks.

You know there is one other thing that comes to mind as I think back at those fun growing-up years. I was one of 20 young people selected for a work/recreation experience in the summer of 1964. The idea was that we worked in the morning and had recreation in the afternoon. I can remember weeding along Dry Creek off Douglas Road and painting the locker room at the community pool. In the afternoon we swam at the pool and even golfed once or twice along with recreational activities. This was one of the interesting and innovative programs that was used to show what a great city Roseville was and help in its efforts to be named an All-American City (which of course it was).

One name I was going to nominate was Harry Crabb. He was the first baseball coach that I can remember having and of course mayor and long-time councilman. I was super excited to see that he already has been honored with a park dedicated in his name. I also thought of Fred Besana and noticed there is already one named for his wife Sylvia.

Here are my suggested names for consideration of this great honor:

James Denio – The owner of the Roseville Auction and Farmers Market which brought people from miles away to Roseville each weekend. This was a unique place and it was fun to bring friends or relatives who might be visiting to see it. Jim Denio was also a kind, generous man who helped others.

Joseph Sorenson – The co-owner of the Roseville Livestock Auction. Just across the street of Denio's establishment the livestock auction also was well known in Northern California. This was a regional livestock auction with people coming from 50+ miles away to sell and buy cattle and other farm animals. Mr. Sorenson was also active in the community serving as a bishop among other things for the local congregation of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He and his wife Lois also are the parents of a significant philanthropist, Jim Sorenson, who has donated significantly for cancer and genetic research at the University of Utah among other things.

Kenneth Lonnergan – The principal of Cirby School for many years and later moving to the City/County Office of Education. His many contributions to education affected many students over many years in Roseville.

Good luck with your task. I am sure it will be a lot of fun and also very difficult making this choice. I appreciate the opportunity to be a part of the process.

Park Naming Process **DRAFT REVISION (October 2016)**

Parks, Recreation & Libraries

On ~~2016~~, City Council approved changes to the park naming process. These changes apply to parks and facilities within parks only. The naming process for City buildings and other City facilities remains unchanged.

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Annual Advertisement Period

On the first working day in July, a press release would be sent out notifying the public and interested individuals that name suggestions are being sought for new parks and new facilities within parks under construction during that fiscal year period (July 1 to June 30). This suggestion period is open for three weeks. Names should be submitted to the City Clerk and forwarded to appropriate staff.

Annual List

The names received during this open advertisement period would be compiled into a list with the following provisions:

1. The list will be maintained as "active" for a one (1) year period and will be reviewed for name considerations for park projects and facilities within parks scheduled for construction during the same time period of the advertisement;
2. The Park Naming Subcommittee maintains the right to select a name appropriate for the park based on geographical location, such as street names, subdivision name, or adjacent school name;
3. A name suggestion cannot be submitted more than three consecutive years;
4. The Park Naming Subcommittee maintains the right to select a name not on the "active" list due to special circumstances, such as historical significance; ~~the passing of an active contributor(s) to the community; or~~ other.

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Criteria for Naming a Park Facility

Names must:

1. reflect geographical location;
2. reflect significant natural features;
3. honor a significant individual (See below)

Individuals must have made a significant contribution to the Roseville community, including, but not limited to:

Deleted: facility

A - Donation of land or large financial contribution to a specific facility;

Deleted: the

B - Contributed substantially and improved the quality of life in Roseville. This could relate to involvement with Parks and Recreation or other volunteer community involvement activities towards the betterment of life in Roseville.

C - Died or disabled in the line of duty as part of City service.

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Naming of new parks or recreation facilities should also consider:

- Including "Roseville" for regional or city-wide parks and recreation facilities;
- Avoidance of duplication of surnames in order to ease confusion of sites and locations for the general public;

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The Subcommittee reserves the right to consider exceptions due to extraordinary circumstances which inspire vision and civic engagement. Exceptions can be made when the actions or contributions of an individual not normally meeting the established criteria are so significant and profound that this person deserves consideration.

Each park or facility within a park, such as ball-playing fields, groves of trees, walkways, trails and buildings, or special rooms in a building could be named after selected individuals in their honor as desired and as appropriate.

It is noted that the City of Roseville is grateful for the sacrifices of our fallen soldiers and veterans who served our country. With limited parks and recreation facilities available, it is difficult to place a higher value or honor of one life over another. Therefore, honoring our fallen soldiers and veterans shall be directed to existing veteran-related programs within the City.

Deleted: park

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Additionally, re-naming of an existing park due to costs, potential loss of neighborhood identity and other considerations shall be discouraged. The City Council reserves the right to consider park sites, not associated with a specific individual(s), to add onto an existing established park name due to special circumstances. In such cases, the original park name shall not be replaced. Under these special circumstances, community contributions towards the offset of costs incurred to change signage shall be a component of the approval process. To ensure geographically named parks remain a part of the process, an effort shall be made to balance the naming of parks in the range of 20% of the parks within the park system inventory shall be geographically based at any given time.

Selection Process

The Park Naming subcommittee is made up of the three officers of the Parks and Recreation Commission; the Mayor and one City Council member.

1. The Subcommittee shall review all names and recommend a short list of up to three name for each new park or recreation facility scheduled for construction during the same fiscal year;
2. The short list of selected names shall be reviewed by the Parks and Recreation Commission for consideration at a formal meeting;
3. Thereafter, the Parks and Recreation Commission shall forward the short list of recommendations to the City Council for formal approval. The Commission may elect to recommend a name per park or facility for Council consideration along with the short list. All names submitted during the submission period shall be forwarded to the City Council with the recommendations. This shall include the "active list" of names from the previous year;
4. Potential namesakes will be contacted by Staff prior to the Parks & Recreation Commission meeting

Now that we are fully into Fall, Park Operations is gearing up for the ever changing weather conditions as well as wrapping up projects and starting new ones.

This past month we closed the Bear Dog Park at Mahany to make some much needed improvements. This is part of our Dog Park Maintenance Management Plan recently implemented that will include improvements at all dog parks over the next year. The enhancements at Bear Dog Park include over seeding the turf, trimming up trees, and cleaning the decomposed granite areas.

The Vernon Street Town Square Splash Pad has now be closed for the season. We will soon begin the process for winterization of the Splash Pad.

As the season for soccer and softball comes to an end we will start on many field renovation projects. As weather permits, we are planning to work on softball field renovations at Maidu and Mahany. This work will include adding infield material, aeration, infield lip renovation, replacing home plates, and intermixing drying agent material to assist with drying out the fields when there are rain events.

Furthermore, this past month we sprayed the majority of the parks with a broadleaf application. This is an effort to reduce our broadleaf weeds in our parks and improve the quality of our turf.

Over the next month we will prepare for many upcoming holiday events which will begin soon.

November 2016, Parks & Recreation Commission Report

New Parks Under Design or Construction Document Development

W-50B Neighborhood Park Site: (Astill) The Park Development Agreement is targeted to go forward to the Council for approval at the December 7th meeting. The developer is hoping to break ground in the Summer of 2017.

W-50A School/Park: This 6.5 acre school/park site held its first public workshop on August 30, 2016. Initial feedback was collected. The second public meeting was held on October 4, 2016. A concept sketch was reviewed and feedback was collected. Next steps will be a refinement of the plan and post-ing online for a two week write in period.

Rehabilitation Projects

Rube Nelson Park Play Structure: Plans are underway to remove and replace the play structure at this park. Actual replacement has shifted to January 2017.



Parks Out to Bid or Under Construction

Restrooms at Hamel Park: Construction is underway with an anticipated completion in January 2017.

Hughes Park Bridge and Trail: The project is complete.

Turn-Key at Stone Point (Patricia Kennedy): This 3 acre neighborhood park will be constructed by Taylor-Morrison Homes on behalf of the City. This project has started construction.

Turn-Key at Stoneridge (Russ Waltrip Jr): This is being constructed by Elliott Homes on behalf of the City. Construction is underway and is slated to be complete late fall/early winter. (Photo below).

F-97 Pocket Park (Elizabeth Jane Fidyment) This 1.5 acre turn-key park project in West Roseville. The Developer has started construction.

Item to Note:

The construction environment is currently unpredictable. Available resources are limited and the labor force is smaller than in the past. The result of this is higher than normal pricing which can impact allocated budgets. Staff is re-evaluating projects about to be bid. In larger projects, additional phasing might require consideration in order to forward park development of that site. This type of result can be seen in the larger city-wide park sites.

The Christmas Tree is coming soon

This year's Christmas tree is a beautiful White Fir from the Burney mountains near Redding. The tree is 38 feet in height and weighs around 1,500lbs. The tree was harvested in a naturally grown forest, located at 6,500 feet elevation and is approximately 20 years old.

On November 9th the tree will be installed with a 75 ton crane operated by Carlton Enterprises and the Open Space Division staff will assist. Vernon Street will be temporarily closed in the morning. The tree will then be decorated by our lighting contractor just in time for the Holiday Parade - Nov 19th!

Goat Report

Currently, 1,800 goats are working in Roseville, divided into three separate herds. One herd is south of the HP Preserve near Horncastle. The second one is located behind Eskaton Homes near Parkside Way. The third one is located at the end of Foothills Blvd. near the bike trail entrance.

Urban Forester's Notes:

We are currently completing the creek maintenance season.

The main focus is flood conveyance, which includes the removal of downed trees, woody brush, beaver dams, trash and debris. This will also help to reduce the chances of isolated flooding and protect City & private infrastructure.

Our tree maintenance contractor West Coast Arborist, Inc. is continuing with grid pruning, especially addressing trees in medians, to assure proper vehicle clearance and traffic safety.

Crews are currently in the process of applying pre-emergent along the edge of the bike trails to suppress upcoming weeds in spring.
