1. **CALL TO ORDER** - Chair Stearns called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M
2. **ROLL CALL: Present:** Matt Bridge, Mike Esparza, Audrey Huisking, Doyle Radford Jr., Andraé Randolph, Roy Stearns, Sana Zulfiqar **Absent Excused:** Denis Nishihara
3. **PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE** – Commissioner Randolph led all in the Pledge of Allegiance.
4. **PUBLIC COMMENT** – none
5. **MINUTES** – *Motion to approve June 11, 2018 minutes was introduced by Commissioner Huisking; Commissioner Radford seconded and the motion passed unanimously.*
6. **REQUEST/PRESENTATIONS**
 - 6.1 **Project Funding Approval – Youth Sports Coalition (YSC) – Kristi LaRoche**
Ms. LaRoche requested approval for reimbursement to YSC - for Roseville Pony Baseball portion - for replacement of portable pitching mounds in the amount of \$1,965.00.

RECOMMENDATION

This is to inform the Commission that applications for the Youth Commissioner position are being accepted in the City Clerk's office through the end of October. BACKGROUND

This position of Youth Commissioner for Parks and Recreation is a one-year term, with an option to extend the term one additional term. SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION

Approve the following names for the noted new parks; and forward your recommendation on to the City Council for formal approval.

- John L. Sullivan Park for WB-51, a 4.4 acre neighborhood park off of Summerfaire Road south of Pleasant Grove Boulevard in the Westbrook area of Roseville
- Bev Bos Park for F-95, a 1.5 acre pocket park adjacent to open space north of Blue Oaks and West of Fiddymet Road in West Roseville

BACKGROUND

Advertisement for names for the above parks occurred in July 2018. The advertisement period was four (4) weeks. The Subcommittee met on September 17, 2018 to review the name submissions along with names on the “active” from last year. “Active” are those names received the year prior and not selected.

One additional pocket park, F-97, was also considered for naming, however, the Subcommittee chose to delay recommending a name for this site. The start date of the construction for this park is not anticipated until next summer 2019.

Consistent with policy, a short list of names will be forwarded for recommendation to the City Council, upon review and approval by the Parks & Recreation Commission. This year, the Subcommittee elected to forward only one name recommendation for each new park.

Names not selected for recommendation will remain on the “active” list for one year. Names submitted during this latest advertisement are attached.

FISCAL IMPACT

Park identification signs for new parks will be included in the construction budgets of each park.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) does not apply to activities that will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment (CEQA Guidelines §15061(b)(3)). The naming of parks and/or park facilities does not include the potential for a significant environmental effect, and therefore is not subject to CEQA.

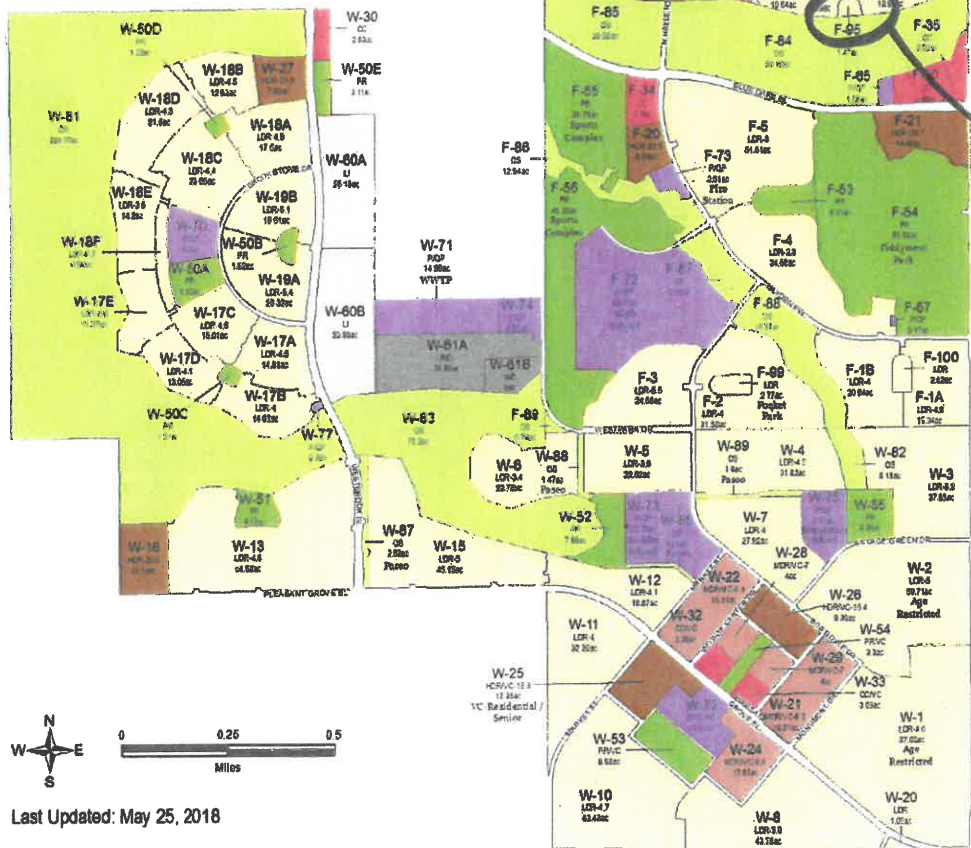

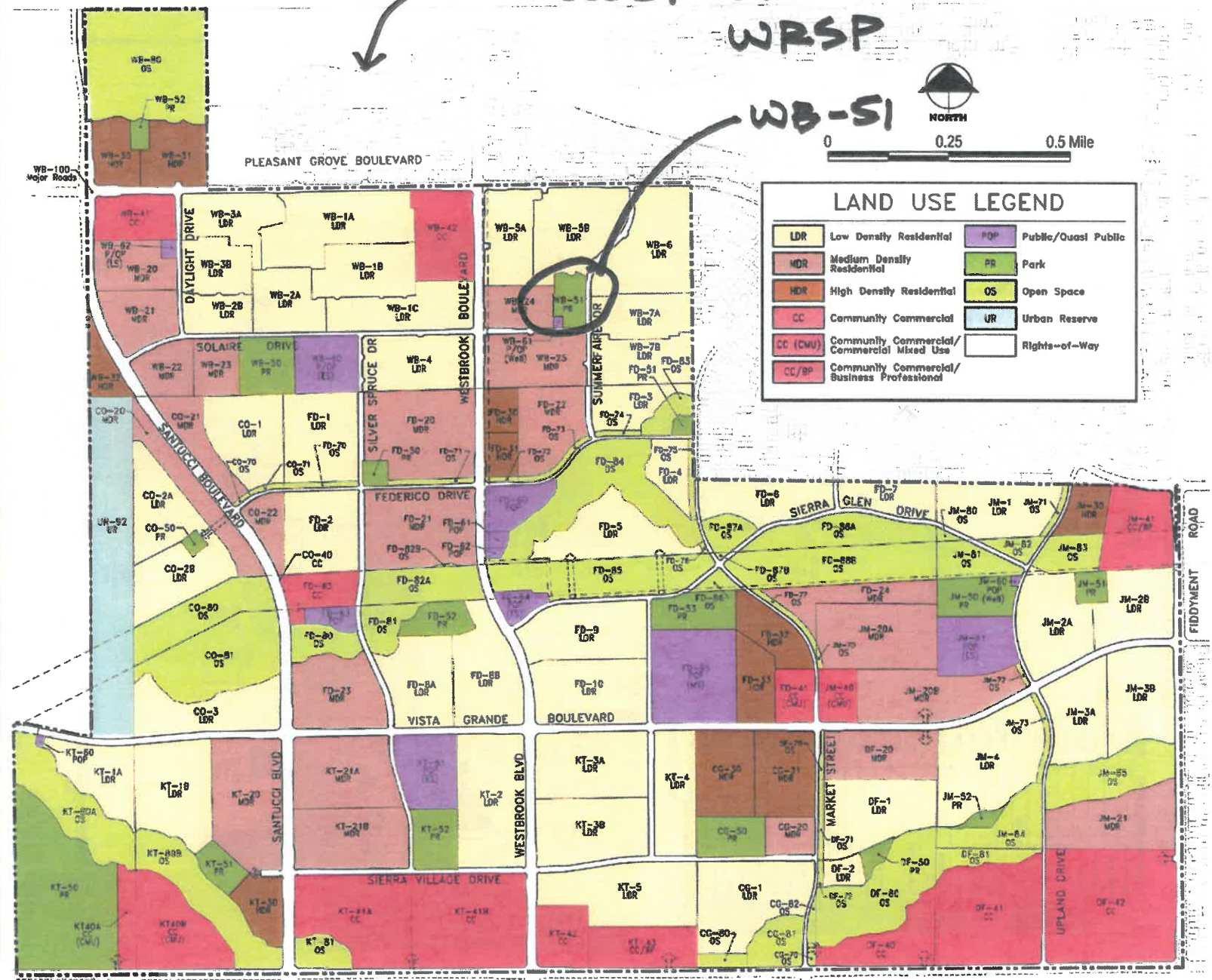


Figure 4-1: Land Use Map

The Last Word: Bev Bos

I've been working with preschoolers for 50 years. When Roseville Community Preschool first opened, what the parents really wanted was a place to take their children so that they could have half a day off to go shopping. But they wanted to make it valuable and kind of fun. When I took the job, I had five children and I thought, "Well, this will give me enough money to buy new shoes." I never thought I would make a career of it. And here I am: I've written books. I've given 6,000 workshops. I've spoken in every state in the union. I really didn't plan it.

I was born and raised in North Dakota. I was a twin and I weighed less than 4 pounds when I was born. The doctor said, "The little girl won't live, but the little boy will." But it didn't work that way. We were a very, very poor family in the sense that my dad didn't make much money, but our lives were really rich with storytelling and singing, singing, singing. My dad and mother used to put the eight of us kids in the car, and we'd just go for a drive so that we could sing. I used to sometimes sit in the back and hope that they had enough money to get us an ice cream cone, but they hardly ever did.

I always know—and I don't know how I know it—what a child needs. I'm really good at paying attention and watching what children do. I can always tell when something is wrong with a child.

For me, being child-centered means I try not to have preconceived ideas. I watch some people and they'll say, "Oh, there's an ADD kid," or whatever. I don't do that. Every child, from their toes up, has value to me. I think

kids are idiosyncratic and they sometimes do weird things, but I just don't pass a judgment on a child, and I never think that there is a child who isn't worth all of my energy.

It is going to destroy us if we don't start paying attention to letting children play. There are 11 conditions for human growth, and all of them fit into play. They need to be outside. They can do so much there. They can feel a sense of belonging there. They can take risks.

All children need one person who will always stand behind them, no matter what's going on. They need one person to whom they can say, "Please, I need help." Someone they can really depend upon. You don't have to be your kid's best friend, but you've got to be their best defender. You've got to stand behind them and hold them tight. You have to tell them, "I'll always be here. Even if you've messed up, I'm going to be here for you."

If you really want to be a good parent, set some time aside every single day to lie on the bed and just listen to your kid. Make it their time. Don't be in a rush. Time is fleeting, so you really need to pay attention.

Educator, author Bev Bos was advocate of play-based preschool programs

Bev Bos, a teacher, author and advocate for play-based learning for preschoolers, was a lifelong learner who never tired of sharing her discoveries with others, say family and friends.

Bos, who served nearly 50 years as director of Roseville Community Preschool, died Feb. 4 in her sleep at her Roseville home. Michael Leeman, her son-in-law, said her death was unexpected. At age 81, she still maintained a busy schedule of national and international speaking engagements. She also was finishing a book manuscript and continued to serve as the preschool's curriculum adviser.

"I don't think you will find a stronger advocate for child-centered, developmentally appropriate, play-based programs," said Camille Maben, executive director of First 5 California, who worked with Bos as a teacher at Roseville Community Preschool, a parent-participation preschool established in the 1960s.

Bos believed that, given the proper environment, young children could choose their own learning activities.

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"She taught us and gave us the ability to trust our children, that they are capable," said Dina Miller, the preschool's business manager, whose children took part in the program.

Leeman, the preschool's director, said his mother-in-law began as a parent volunteer in the 1960s. She had intended to become a primary school teacher, "but she fell in love with preschool and never left," he said.

Over the years, what began as a play group of about 10 children evolved into a preschool program that currently serves 108 students from age 2 years, 9 months through kindergarten. The parents own the school, housed on the Placer County Fairgrounds, and work with program volunteers. The school employs a staff of six teachers and a director, Leeman said.

Bos was in demand as a conference and workshop speaker. She wrote her first book, "Don't Move the Muffin Tins: A Hands-Off Guide to Art for the Young Child" so she wouldn't have to keep printing handouts for seminars, said Leeman, who spent three decades traveling with her as a co-presenter. "We stopped counting at 6,000," he said of the number of speaking engagements.

Their appearances, usually sponsored by educational groups, took them throughout the United States, as well as to Canada and Japan.

"We were supposed to go to Singapore in July," Leeman said. "She was really looking forward to that."

Bos described her life's work as expanding horizons for children and their parents, Leeman said. Her philosophy gained popularity after she was featured on ABC's television show "20/20." "The basics for young children are wonder, discovery and experience," she said. "If it hasn't been in the hand, the body and the heart, it can't be in the brain."

Maben said teachers and parent volunteers at the preschool took their cues from the children.

"People used to say there was no structure, but everything placed there was intentional, so kids could explore, develop a sense of self and know how to be with others in the world," she said.

Beverly Jean Narlock was born, with her twin brother, on Oct. 6, 1934, in Fargo, N.D., to Lawrence and Helen Narlock. She weighed only 3 pounds at birth, said her daughter Carrie Leeman, and the fact that she survived motivated her the rest of her life.

Carrie Leeman said her mother told of the hard times in North Dakota. The family's migration to California when she was 14 sounded like something out of John Steinbeck's "The Grapes of Wrath," she said. When they finally reached San Francisco, the bridge toll was a quarter. With two vehicles and only one quarter, they all piled into the car, leaving the truck and all their belongings on the side of the road until they got the money to retrieve the truck.

Beverly Narlock married Robert Bos in 1954, and they moved from Berkeley to Roseville after the birth of their first child. Over the next six years, Mrs. Bos gave birth to four more children. In 1965, she was asked to teach a few days a week in the co-op preschool.

"This was the start of her hands-on education, the understanding that young children learn best through play," Carrie Leeman said.

Bos was always looking to expand her horizons. She grew up singing with her family, Michael Leeman said, noting that there wasn't a lot to do in Fargo on winter evenings. Later, she taught herself to play the autoharp. She, along with Michael Leeman, who played guitar, and friend Tom Hunter performed community concerts and recorded several albums of children's music.

Maben said she will miss Bos as a friend and colleague.

"What she taught us was about how children learn and how we can help them develop to be the very best people they can be," Maben said.

Bos was preceded in death by her husband. She is survived by daughters Carrie Leeman and Robin Leeman, and sons Micheal Bos and Andrew Bos, all of Roseville, and daughter Julie Bos of Chico, as well as 14 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

A gathering in Bos' honor will be held at 1 p.m. Sunday in Johnson Hall at the Placer County Fairgrounds, 800 All America City Blvd., Roseville. Donations in her memory may be made to Roseville Community Preschool via the school's website, www.RosevilleCP.org, or by calling 916-786-9536.

A Tribute to Bev Bos



In Memoriam: Bev Bos (1934-2016)

The early childhood field lost an inspirational leader with the death of Bev Bos on February 4, 2016. She served nearly 50 years as director of Roseville Community Preschool in Roseville, California, and was a national and international keynote speaker and presenter at over 6,000 conferences and workshops. Her passion, enthusiasm, and approach to working with young children were exceptional and she will be deeply missed. She conveyed the following message in a direct and passionate manner, and with every fiber of her being: Play is an overarching and essential contributor to the development of children.

Wonder (curiosity), self-discovery, problem-solving, interaction, exploration, and play—that's what Bev Bos taught me. Reading and writing come after these approaches to learning are established. Children learn best when they can make their own choices and set their own goals. Because each child is unique, multiple channels of learning must be celebrated. Bev also encouraged families and teachers to be joyful in their engagement with children as they observed and participated in this developmental and educational process.

Some of the phrases Bev used will remain permanently burned on my brain:

Childhood amnesia. If we actually could remember our childhood, we would not do to children what we do to them. Early childhood (ages birth to 8) would still be viewed as a unique period of development with play recognized as being at the core of how children learn best.

We made a mistake calling it preschool. The word “school” conjures up images of teacher as expert, children as sponges—only absorbing information and not being a source of information, the use of desks, listening valued over conversation, quiet environments, and little movement. These descriptors are far removed from what an early learning environment and approach should encompass.

Children don’t learn much through their bottoms. Most adults enjoy remaining stationary as our bodies get weary. Many classrooms are set up to keep us sitting and thus supposedly attentive. In contrast, young children actually expend much more energy trying to remain stationary. Their muscles (and thus their brains) demand that they move their bodies.

Never do for children something they can do for themselves. I often observe this sage advice being ignored, possibly because adults are time-bound whereas children are living in the moment. We hurry, hurry, hurry children to try to save time, quickly completing tasks instead of encouraging them to take on the challenges.

Experience is not the best teacher; it is the only teacher. Children must interact with real people and real things; they need to encounter problems and figure out how to solve them when something doesn't go as one would hope; curiosity and trial-and-error must be championed.

If it hasn’t been in the hand and the body, then it can’t be in the brain. Another endorsement of experiential and hands-on learning.

Children were not born wearing shoes. Remember how good mud felt between your toes? Can we even remember the joy that rippled through our bodies and brains when we squished mud between our fingers and toes? Provide sensory experiences every day for children.



Children need real and authentic experiences

Children have to do and use too much of everything in order to figure out the world. This is at the heart of understanding how important mess and repeated activities are in helping children make sense of their worlds.



Ooops! Learning sometimes involves a big mess!

All learning involves risk. The environment and adults must provide opportunities for risk-taking in the learning process; 'mistakes' are expected components of the inquiry process and valued for the knowledge they provide. Risk is not to be confused with hazard. Bev noted that we need to consider the 'illusion of risk.' It is our responsibility as educators to figure out how to provide experiences that children perceive as containing elements of risk, but in reality are still safe in nature. We also need to explain to families why children need to take risks: through risk-taking experiences children learn to match their skills to the demands of the task. This is a delicate balance because our society is risk-averse due to potential legal ramifications. However, the neurological feedback children gain from the trial and error of risk-taking enables them to develop the precursor skills in their brains that will enable them to manage risk assessment as adults.

Earliest isn't best. Fastest isn't best. "If what we want for our children is a lifetime of excellence—in experience, in ability, in knowledge—we must be responsible enough to wait and thorough enough to look at all sides of their development" (Bev Bos). We need to pay attention to how we can help foster children's engagement in learning so that they become lifelong learners. Children's brains have not changed; only the expectation about what children should be doing. These unrealistic expectations that ignore well-known and researched child development principles are having a deleterious impact on

children's social competence and their ability to become successful learners in academic settings. A holistic approach to the education of young children must be adopted and practiced, not just in preschool but up to third grade (at least).

Our flexibility and willingness to follow a child's lead will allow remarkable things to happen, if we let them. This is about trusting children and not being afraid to examine and explore; we should model how to go about finding answers to questions. The unknown should be celebrated as an opportunity for learning, not as a fearsome threat to our power as teachers.

Sharing books with children is an invitation for a conversation. Although we should strive to read high-quality literature with children, the focus is not just on the content contained within the pages. What is also important is the conversation adults have with the child (children) about the story and illustrations before, during, and after the reading. This is because authentic learning occurs when it is connected to meaningful experiences that are mediated with a caring adult. Books are a catalyst for sharing memories, values, and beliefs, as well as bridges to prior learning that help to support children's burgeoning understanding of their day-to-day lives. In fact, Bev never thought it was important to finish a story. If a child wants to stay on the first page of a book, showing full engagement and asking a host of questions, then that is perfectly acceptable. It is the rich conversation that is important.

Ask: "Whose needs are being met?" When Bev was on her first visit to Chautauqua County, I remember her marveling at our colorful leaves, since Northern California does not have the variety of trees that exist here. She gathered up several bagsful from my yard, as well as at other stopping points in our travels, to take back to the children at Roseville. During her next visit, she arrived excited to share a most fantastic experience that had occurred at her preschool. She had arranged for a dump truck to deposit a load of sand directly into the classroom. She joyfully described the delight the children had in playing indoors on the big pile of sand and how they gradually, over a two-month period, carried the sand outdoors in small buckets. (Two hours earlier some teachers from a local Head Start program had shared with me the devastating news that their sand tables had been removed from the classrooms. Why, I asked? The answer was because the sand was wearing away the fiber of the new carpets.) The juxtaposition of these two opposite approaches to being with children astounded me and compelled me from that day forward to encourage teachers to always ask themselves one of the most important questions in decision making: Whose needs are being met?

Our challenge is not to prepare children for school, but to prepare schools for children. (Docia Zavitskovksy)

Bev had this quote written on one of the walls at the Roseville Community Preschool, helping remind her (and all of us) about what is important when we take on the responsibility to be with children.

These words prompt us to acknowledge that getting children 'ready' is not an end goal that we should want to achieve. Children possess a different temporal sensibility than adults. They do not regularly think about tomorrow, nor do they very often contemplate yesterday. They live in the present moment; we need to join them there if we do not want to miss out on how they are thinking, investigating, and creating their world. A practice of mindfulness is required so that we can be with children now.

Finally, Bev had the ability to make everyone around her feel competent and interesting, encouraging us to share our stories of success and failure in order to envision the next steps in our professional development. She loved the learning journey that children were experiencing. She knew that the best job anyone could have in life was discovering the world over and over again through the bright eyes of children. The joy she shared about teaching young children was infectious and I will never forget her laugh. I don't know whether Bev thought of herself as an agent of change in the field of early childhood, but she was and will remain so as her ideas and philosophy will continue to ripple out like swells in the ocean. So, in tribute to Bev, let the playing commence!

ROSEVILLE — Veteran preschool teacher Lois Donovan quietly watches a classroom filled with 4 and 5 year olds.

She calmly cautions a young boy, who is about to topple a precariously built block tower. The child complies with a smile, unabashed by Donovan's subtle warning.

According to Donovan, being soft-spoken goes a long way with children. "You catch more flies with honey," she said.

hospitals, but will not completely abandon the world of crayons and Curious George. She plans to volunteer in some child-related field — saving just enough time for her three grandchildren and six adult children.

In the meantime, she is preparing for a graduation. Those of her students moving into kindergarten will receive paper briefcases filled with samples of their work, along with height and weight measurements taken at the beginning of the year.

Susan Rey, who has been teaching at the preschool for 15 years, said she tells the students Donovan will be graduating alongside them this year. "Whether she'll make it to kinder-

garten, we don't know," Rey joked. Rey said of Donovan's "special" sense of humor, "A lot of people have a hard time keeping up with her."

"She's surely going to be missed."

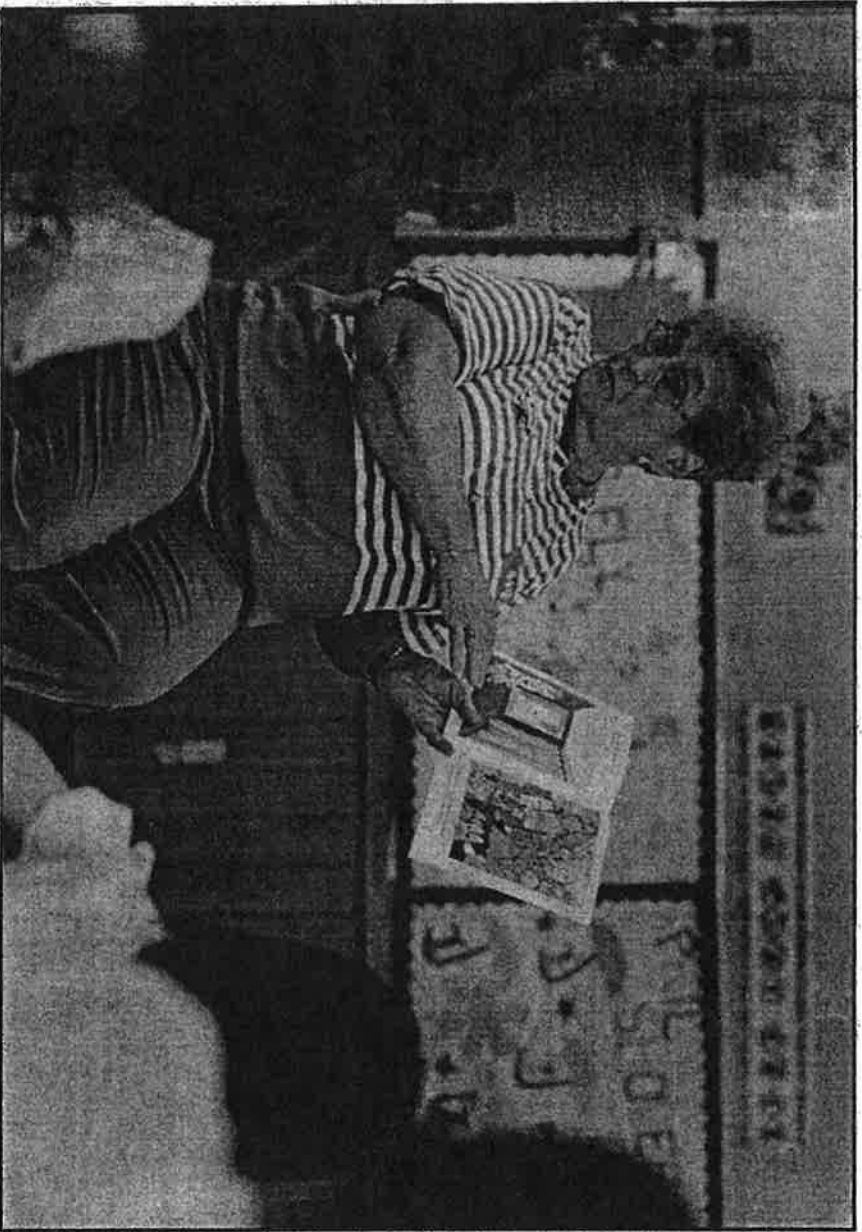
Another parent, Carol Lopez, added, "She makes every child feel special."

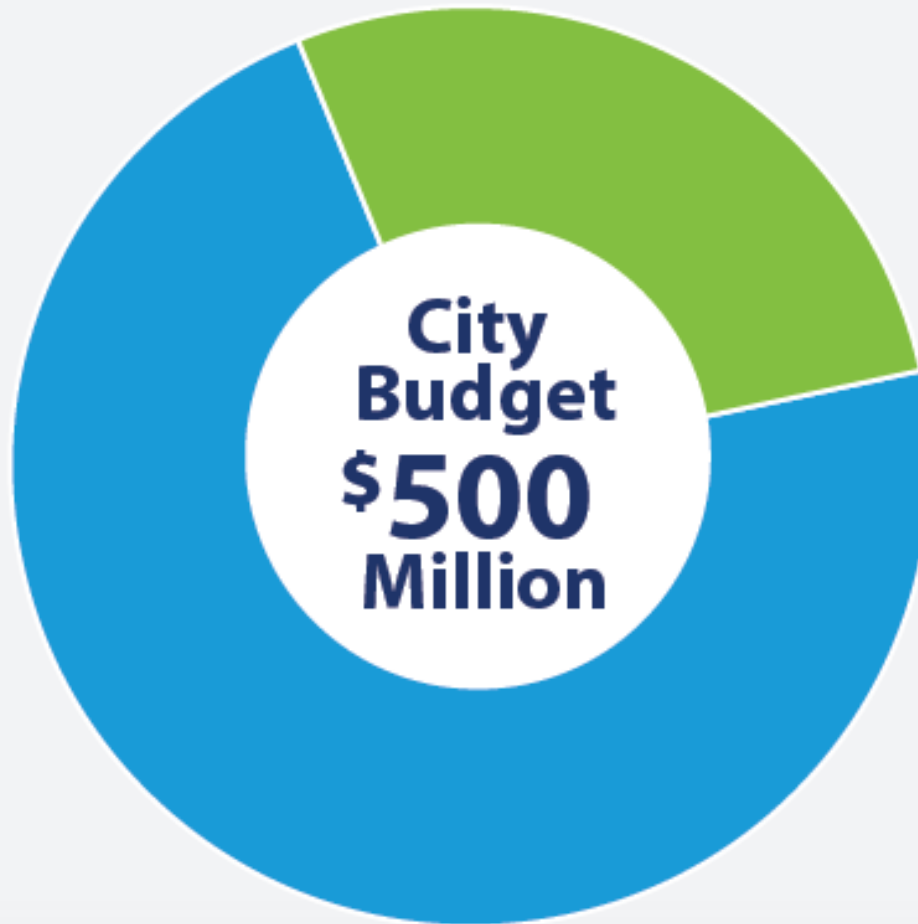

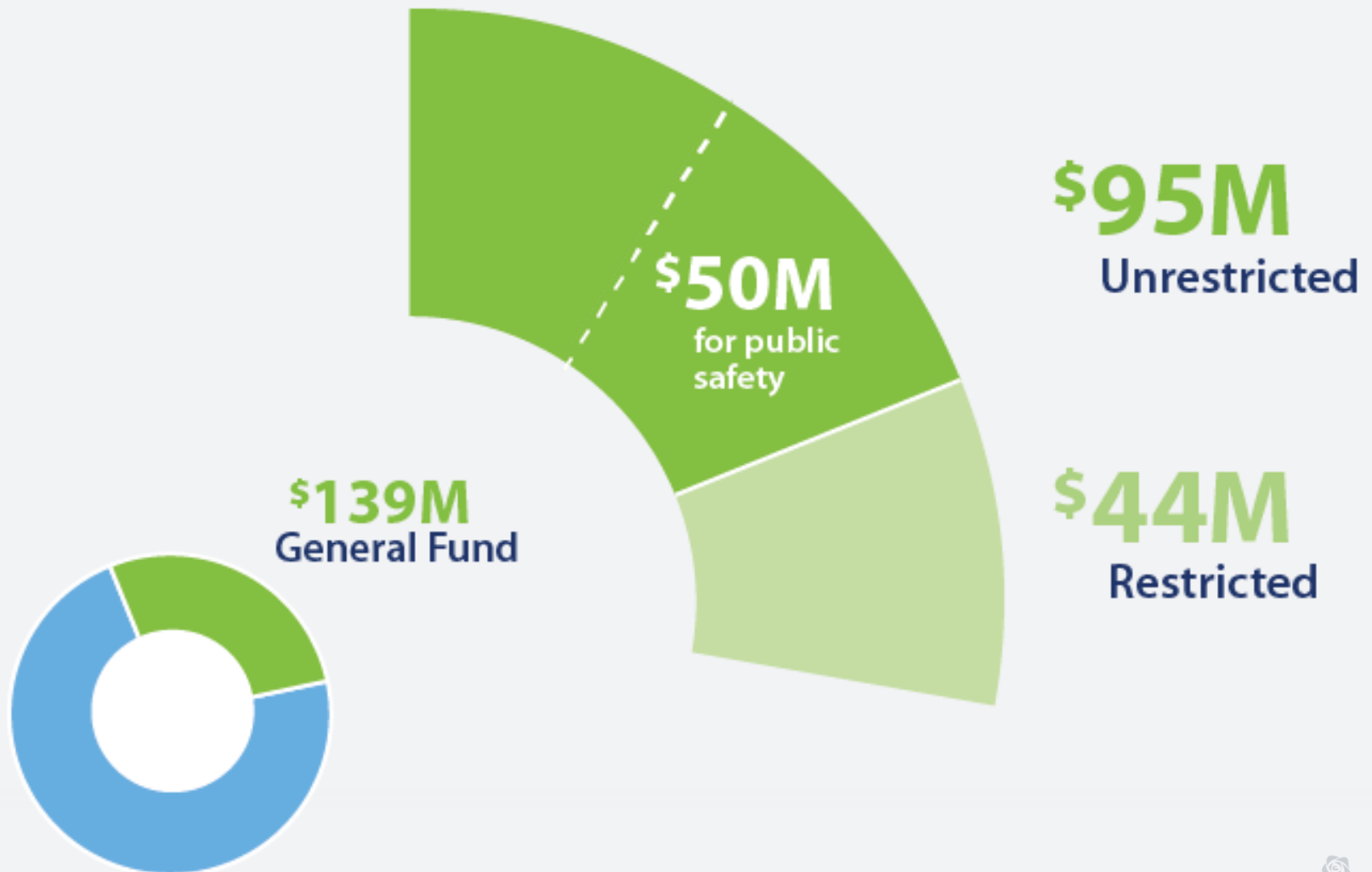

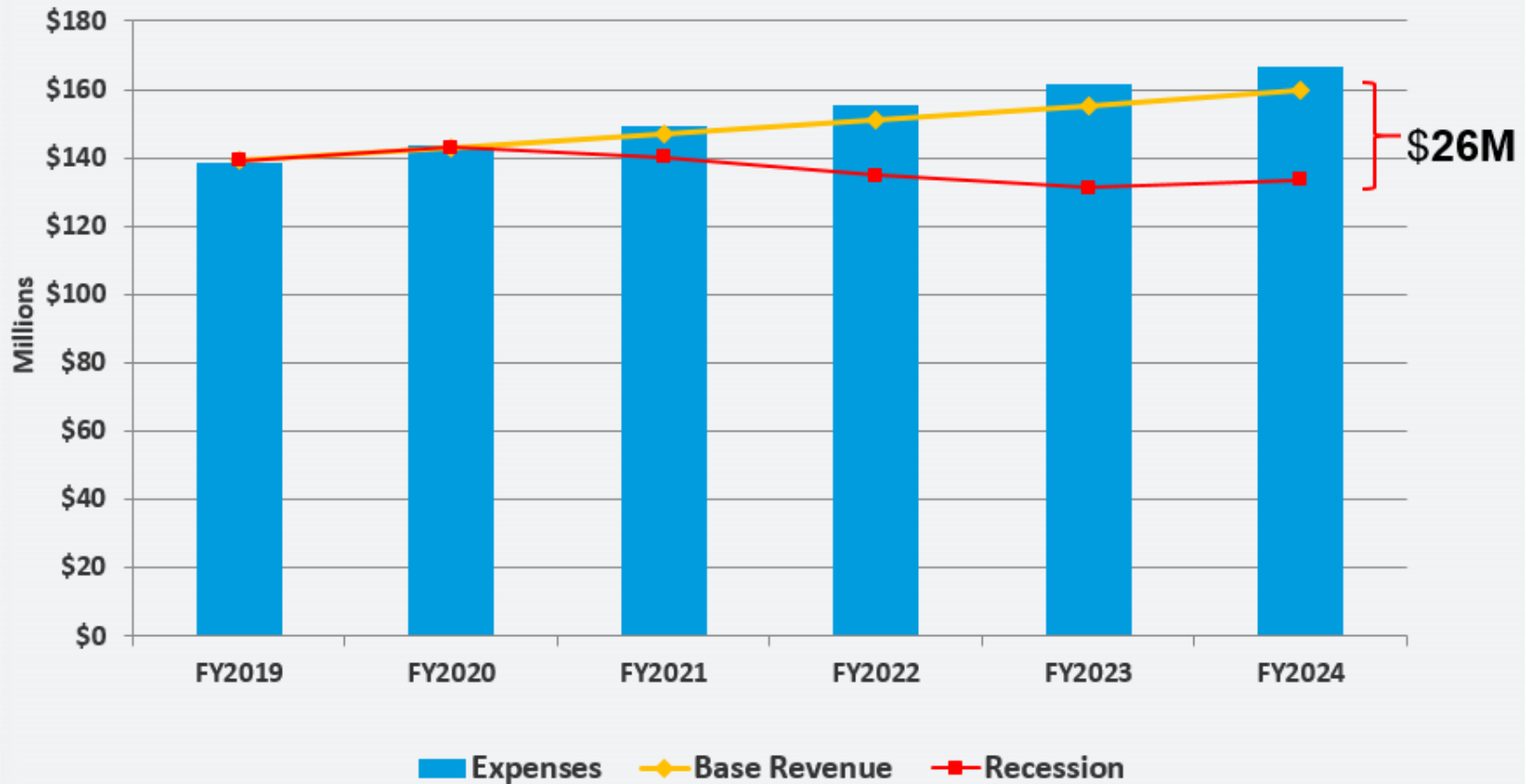

Measure B on November 2018 ballot

- ½ cent transactions and use (sales) tax increase
 - From 7.25% to 7.75%
- General tax requiring majority approval: 50%+1
- Would take effect April 1, 2019
- Would remain in place until ended by voters

Measure B on November 2018 ballot

- Estimated to generate \$16M-\$19M annually
- State cannot take any of Measure B revenues
- All revenue goes to the General Fund
 - Maintaining neighborhood police patrols
 - Fire protection
 - 9-1-1 emergency response times
 - Maintaining crime suppression and investigation

 - Parks, recreation facilities and programs, libraries

 - Senior and youth services

Measure B on November 2018 ballot

- Citizens' oversight committee

Sales Tax facts

- Roseville's current sales tax of $7\frac{1}{4}\%$ is minimum allowed by state law
- With $\frac{1}{2}$ cent increase, Roseville would still be equal or less than most in region
- How costs would increase:
 - A \$10 meal would increase 5 cents
 - A \$100 retail purchase would increase 50 cents
- **Estimated annual cost to typical household:**
 - **\$67 a year**
