## RECOMMENDATION

Recommend commissioners review the grant application rankings and proposed average funding to determine award amounts to forward to the City Council for 2022-2023 Citizen's Benefit Fund and REACH funds.

## BACKGROUND

Using the attached 2022-2023 Scoring Questions and scale, the Grants Advisory Commission reviewed 27 qualified applications received by the City of Roseville for the Citizen's Benefit Fund and REACH funds. The 2022-2023 funds equal a total of \$279,684 (\$277,913 in the Citizen's Benefit Fund and \$1,768 in REACH Funds) to award to grant applicants. The Commission will discuss grant funding recommendations for the qualified applications at the meeting.

Attached is a copy of the Grant Application Scoring Questions and Scoring Scale and a summary of all grant applications received this funding cycle outlining the description of the program and the amount that was requested.

## Review Criteria for 2022-2023 Funding Cycle for Citizens Benefit Fund (CBF) and REACH Grant Applications

### Grant Threshold Requirements

Applications will only be considered if:

- Applicant submitted all required application documents by the application deadline
- Applicant submitted required annual report(s) for 2020-2021 CBF and REACH grants

### Grant Application Scoring Questions and Scoring Scale

1. Application demonstrates the need for the project or program.	15
2. Application clearly defines the project/program and how success is measured.	15
3. Application reflects mission and meets the general requirements and guidelines for CBF and/or REACH.	5
4. Requested funds achieve an impact on the identified need.	20
5. Application demonstrates evidence of community support.	10
6. Application clearly describes how the collaborative partners increase efficiency and efficacy of the grant.	10
7. Request is reasonable given the proposed project/program and the organization's experience and capacity.	5
8. Project budget is clear and organization's budget demonstrates sustainability.	10
9. Additional funding support for this project/program is clearly identified.	5
10. Application clearly identifies how agency will reduce costs or generate additional revenue to cover project/program and operating costs.	5
