Outcomes on EU Tracked Bills

- Tracked over 230 bills affecting our three utilities, plus about 200 state budget measures.
- Actively engaged on 26 measures.

EU Position	Total	2-year	Chaptered	Vetoed
Watch	153	126	22	5
Support	12	6	4	2
Oppose Unless Amended	6	5	1	0
Oppose	7	4	3	0
Neutral	1	1	0	0

- Shifted positions on three bills: two from Oppose Unless Amended to Neutral (one signed into law) and one from Watch to Support (also signed into law).

New Laws

SB 31 (McNerney) Water quality: recycled water (Support)

Updates the California Water Code to align the uses of recycled water with modern technologies and practices.

SB 499 (Stern) Residential projects: fees and charges (Support)

Allows water and wastewater utilities to collect connection and capacity charges at the time a development application is received versus deferring until certification of occupancy.

Vetoed Bills

SB 682 (Allen) Environmental health: product safety: perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS) substances (Support)

Beginning January 1, 2028, this bill would have prohibited a person from distributing, selling, or offering for sale products that contain intentionally added PFAS. Additionally, the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) would have had to adopt regulations to carry out the provisions of this bill by January 1, 2029.

SB 454 (McNerney) State Water Resources Control Board: PFAS Mitigation Program (Support)

This bill, upon appropriation by the Legislature, would have enacted a PFAS mitigation program to help reduce the costs associated with treating PFAS in drinking water and wastewater through grants, loans, contracts, or technical services to eligible water suppliers.

Two-Year Bills: Support

AB 532 (Ransom) Water rate assistance program (Support)

Would provide express authority to larger water suppliers to create a local rate assistance program in a manner that best meets its community's needs.

SB 431 (Arreguin) Assault and battery: public utility employees and essential infrastructure workers (Support)

Would expand current law to make an assault or battery committed against public utility employees or essential infrastructure workers punishable by fine or jail time.

Two-Year Bills: Support Continued

SB 496 (Hurtado) Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation: appeals advisory committee: exemptions (Support)

Would establish the Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation Appeals Advisory Committee to review denied exemptions and time requests. And, broadens what vehicles qualify as being able to respond to emergency situations.

SB 501 (Allen) Household Hazardous Waste Producer Responsibility Act (Support)

Would establish an extended producer responsibility (EPR) or stewardship program for the collection, transportation, recycling, and the safe and proper management of products containing household hazardous waste (HHW) in California.

Two-Year Bills: Oppose Unless Amended

AB 874 (Avilla Farias) Mitigation Fee Act: waiver of fees: affordable rental housing (Oppose Unless Amended)

Would require local agencies to waive certain development fees for residential projects where at least 49% of units are reserved for lower-income households for 55-years.

SB 350 (Durazo) Water Rate Assistance Program (Oppose Unless Amended)

Would create a statewide Water Rate Assistance program for low income water and wastewater customers. There is currently no funding source identified.

July 15: California Air Resources Board Released Amendments for a 45-day Comment Period

August – September: Participated in meetings with CARB Board Members

September 11: Hosted a Tour of the Pleasant Grove Energy Recovery Project for Air Resources Board Staff.

September 15: Written Comments Due

September 22: 14 Legislators Submitted a Letter to CARB in Support of CASA's Ask

September 25: Public Hearing where Director Bigley and Utility Government Relations Administrator Mattock Delivered Oral Comments

- Requested \$2.04 million

Electric Legislative/Regulatory Update

Advocacy in the 2025 Legislative Session

- Tracking over 185 bills
 - Active Advocacy on over 15 bills
- Legislative topics:
 - Cap-and-Trade Reauthorization
 - Independent Regional Organization
 - Energy Storage Systems
 - Utility Disconnection Policies
 - Load Shifting
- Federal Legislation: H.R. 1

New Law: AB 1207 (Irwin) Cap & Trade Program

- Statewide limit on greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions; price signal to drive long-term investment in cleaner fuels, efficient uses of energy
- AB 1207 reauthorizes program through 2045, neutral on POUs
- Continued utility allocation for compliance and consignment
- Cap & Invest; gas corporation allowances to POUs as direct credit
- Supported AB 1207; energy affordability key advocacy driver

New Law: AB 825 (Petrie-Norris) Regional Market

- Allows CA utilities to voluntarily participate in energy markets whose rules are governed by an independent regional organization
- Enables West to create a suite of voluntary wholesale electricity market services without relying on any one state or Balancing Authority
- More partners expands access to generation, reliability, and lower costs
- Several requirements to meet before independent regional organization forms including tariff modifications, CAISO resolution, PUC determination
- Supported AB 825 in final form (largely opposed prior version: SB 540)

New Law: SB 254 (Becker) WMP Submittal

- Modifies wildfire mitigation plan (WMP) submittal to at least once every 4 years as determined by the Wildfire Safety Advisory Board (WSAB)
- Previously submitted updates to the WSAB annually
- Roseville an urban area with significant undergrounding
- Supported SB 254 with focus on WMP reporting timeline

New Law: SB 283 (Laird) Energy Storage Systems

- New energy storage facilities designed in accordance with certain standards
- Approval of an energy storage system only if it is in a dedicated-use noncombustible building or outdoor installation above a certain size threshold
- A previous threshold (600 kwh) and “remote” outdoor installation language was problematic
- Successful advocacy resulted in increasing the threshold to 10 MWh and removing the term “remote” from the requirement

New Law: AB 777 (Rodriguez) Food Assistance

- Goal to expand access to food assistance during disasters
- POU's to respond to data request by Department of Social Services
- Require POU's to provide aggregated customer outage data at zip code level, for outages of 4 hours or longer, within 7 calendar days of request
- Requires dedicated point of contact at POU
- Advocacy encompassed ensuring no MOU required
- Ended with a neutral position on the bill

Failed Passage: SB 332 (Wahab) Disconnections

- Prior versions prohibited disconnecting service for nonpayment if a person at the residence was a specific age, pregnant, postpartum, etc.
- Each POU, by March 1, 2027, to annually post on their website the total number of customers terminated due to non-payment and reconnected
- POU disconnection policies to be posted on website before July 1, 2026
- Opposed bill in several iterations; agreed on compromise amendments
- Bill ultimately failed passage in Assembly

Vetoed: SB 541 (Becker) Load Shifting

- “Load shifting” means a reduction in electricity demand that benefits the electrical grid
- 2023 Load Shift Report estimates CA could achieve 7GW of load shifting by 2030
- CEC to estimate each retail supplier’s load shift potential, including consideration of relative share of statewide load of each retail supplier
- By 7/1/28 CEC to analyze and publish the amount of load shifting that each retail supplier achieved in prior year and expectations for future years as a comparison to the load shifting potential estimated for each retail supplier
- Process may dictate amount of load shifting and impose additional costs to comply
- Opposed; Governor vetoed as redundant and disruptive of existing planning efforts

Federal: One Big Beautiful Bill Act – H.R. 1

- The One Big Beautiful Bill Act of 2025 (H.R. 1) was signed on July 4, 2025
- Phases out ITC/PTC for wind & solar; projects must begin construction before 7/4/2026 or be placed in service before 2028 to be eligible for the ITC or PTC
- H.R. 1 could impact projects needed to meet California's goals
- Advocacy outcomes: municipal bonds remain untaxed; elective pay preserved

Federal: Cybersecurity Information Sharing Act

- CISA 2015 allows the voluntary sharing of cybersecurity threat information between the federal government and private entities, including public power
- Provides protection for these information sharing activities
- Roseville supported long-term reauthorization of CISA 2015
- Unfortunately, CISA expired on 09/30/25 and was not reauthorized
- This does not impact information shared with the E-ISAC

CA Regulatory: Underground Safety Board

- The CA Underground Safety Board is considering regulation changes with regards to new subsurface installations using GIS
- Proposes position accuracy within 4 inches; new mapping
- Requires survey grade equipment we do not currently own
- Proposal will create a burden on Roseville staff resources
- Roseville submitted comments; waiting further action from the board

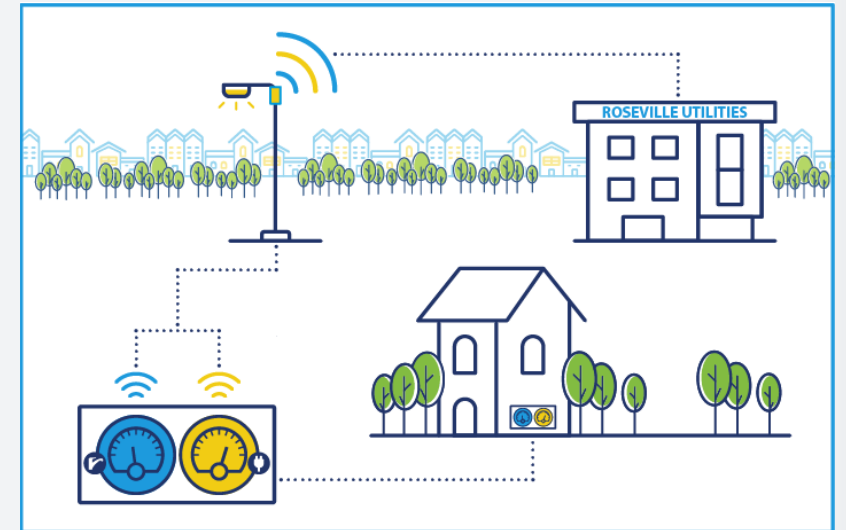

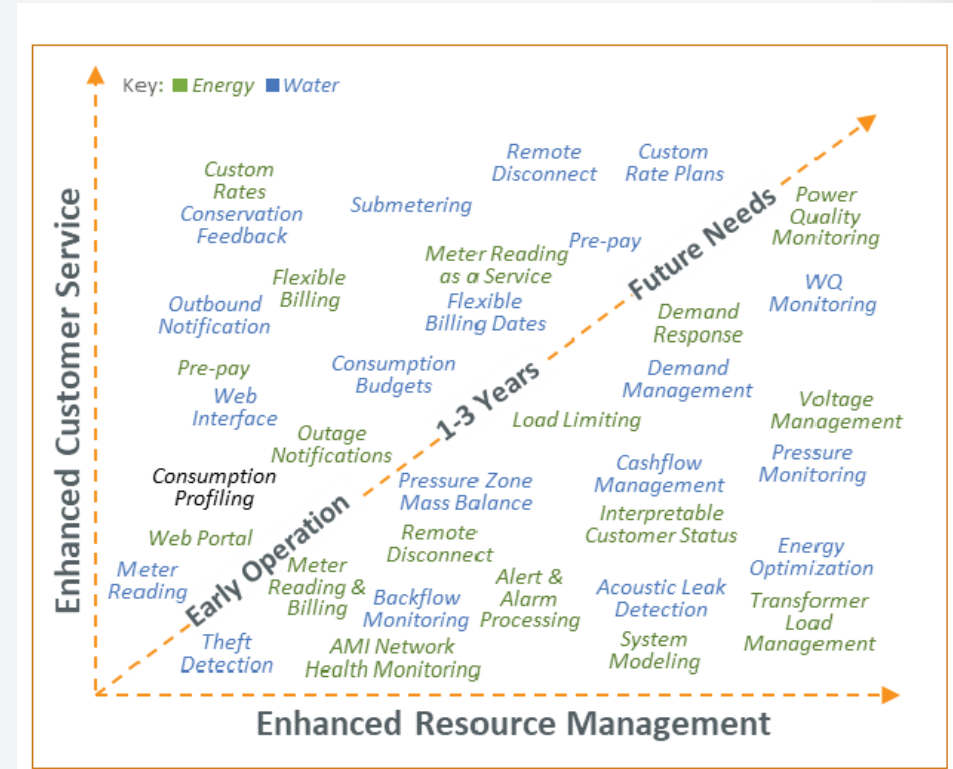
Advancing Utility Initiatives with AMI “Day 2”
